- 4. Why is it ironic that the editors and Ballentine Books were taking out the swear words from *Fahrenheit 451*? How does that relate to what you know about censorship?

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# Remind me: What is Theme? (Write this down)

- Theme is the underlying topic, moral, or lesson from a work.
  - Theme is a topic or message covered throughout the story that is often a moral or a "truth"
  - Theme is usually not stated outright, but is determined by the reader
  - Theme is not specific to one story at one time, but can apply to real life and other works.

### Discuss as a table (write this down):

- 1. What is a theme of *Fahrenheit 451*? What was Ray Bradbury trying to teach us as readers? What is his message or moral?
- 2. How does the setting (time and place) help us understand this message?
- 3. How do the characters help us understand this message?
- 4. How do events (plot) in the story help us understand this message?
- 5. Do you think this book is outdated, or does it still apply to our world today?

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What things impact theme (setting, character, events?)? Is this theme still relevant?

If you had to write an essay about a theme in *Fahrenheit 451*, what would you write about?
